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EAST COKER VILLAGE HALL CHARITABLE TRUST

We are sure the majority of you are now aware that the East Coker Village Hall roof has come to the end of its useful life – in fact, it you look up you will notice patches on the ceiling – tell-tale signs of water ingress. This is due to the original roofing panels eroding. A great deal of work has gone into this project, the cost of which will be in the region of £110,000. As is very often the case, having cleared one hurdle, another is put up which we have to jump – the latest being that, as we are a 'public building', we have had to put in for building control. Funds currently stand at circa half of the monies required. We are most grateful to those parishioners, clubs and users of the Hall for donations which they have made to the fund. In addition, the sums raised by the organisers of the Picnic in the Park and the Annual Christmas Lunch are much appreciated. Our thanks to all of you.

We continue to work on various fundraising ideas, which, once set in motion, will be advertised and which we hope will be well supported. We are extremely fortunate to have such a facility, which the trustees are keen to maintain and improve to as high a standard as possible. 

They travelled by train to Holland, Germany, Switzerland and Italy – before taking six trains back-to-back from Rome to Yeovil.



International opportunities are highlights for anyone within scouting and they spent four days at Kandersteg International Camp site in Switzerland alongside scouts from across Europe, where the scale of the mountains and the stunning scenery impressed as much as the icy lake swim. Whilst in Berlin, they visited Checkpoint Charlie and whilst in Naples wandered the ruins of Pompeii. An evening cooking lesson in Rome which included pizza and tiramisu making was far more successful than trying to cook 'local' cabbage soup in Berlin. The team presented the tales of their adventure to parents, scout leaders and the Crusader explorers as the final part on the Belt. Congratulations to all.

Our cubs have already been kayaking at Sutton Bingham and have a varied programme of activities planned for this term.

EAST COKER PRIMARY SCHOOL



Happy New Year from everyone at East Coker Primary School!

What a very busy autumn term we have had. Our topic was 'Scrumdidlyumptious' and there was quite a bit of cooking going on, making cakes and the older children made their very own chocolate bar!

We began the year welcoming our new Reception children who have really enjoyed our play based learning and outdoor area. In October our Year 3 children began brass lessons thanks to the PTFA who kindly pay for all children in Year 3 to learn a musical instrument for ten weeks.

We have been on several visits this term as well. Our Year 6 children went off to Oakhampton for a week which was subsidised by the PTFA. This was a new venue for us due to the smaller numbers we have in year 6 this year but a huge hit and we will be going again in September. They thoroughly enjoyed the axe throwing, archery and gorge scrambling to name just a few of the activities they took part in.

There was also a visit to Exmouth Zoo for Year 3 and Year 4 children which everyone really enjoyed. This linked with our science topic this term. This was also heavily subsidised by the PTFA.

I am very proud to say that we have earned the Gold Artsmark Award this term due to the high level of arts we provide across the curriculum both during and out of school time. Huge thanks to Mrs S Allen for all her hard work and for elevating The Arts even further. The biggest change for us is the greater responsibility our children have been given in running events and making changes across The Arts curriculum.

As part of our longer-term IT plan, the classes have all been updated with new and much larger smartboards. This enables us to keep up to date with the latest tech to continue to support teaching and learning. The next job is a new phone system coming in January!

Mr Maddick, our Site Manager has been working hard to support the school with improvements to the Willows block. We have now created our very own cookery room for the children to be able to use as part of their Design and Technology curriculum. We have a lovely new kitchen, fitted with new furniture, to help deliver cookery lessons.



We have also had a very successful term with our new Breakfast and After School Club. The children have really enjoyed the outdoor space and the wide range of art and crafts available. They have also loved the bacon sandwiches and pizza bagels!

At the end of the term, we had our usual Christmas door competition as well as decorating the whole school. We were very lucky to have a beautiful Christmas Tree donated to the school from Palmers, which the children decorated with their own decorations.

We were also exceptionally lucky this year to get a visit from Santa and his elf who dropped by via helicopter. They stayed and spoke to the children and sang songs before they flew off to visit other schools. The children had a really lovely time. Thank you RNAS Yeovilton.

The PTFA and helpers had a very busy two afternoons supporting the children with their Christmas shopping and wrapping. They also had their Christmas raffle which showcased some fantastic hampers. Thanks to the events the PTFA run, the money raised is used to make further improvements for the children. Last year, the PTFA supported the children in many special events, reduced costs to parents for school visits and also did some match funding in order to improve our outdoor area. This was led by the school council.

We had several end of year Christmas events such as our Reception Sing A Long and our Infant Nativity. We also had our annual Christmas carol service 'Christmas Around The World' at St Michaels and All Angels' church led by the children, with support from by Reverend Rod and Toffer. It was a really lovely way to end the term, and we are extremely grateful to be able to use the church.

Our theme this spring term is 'Castles' and we are looking forward to finding out about the Elizabethans and significant historical events and individuals.

We are also very excited to be working with Mr Simon Dicker at OSR projects in West Coker once again. Children have been selected to take part in a number of clay workshops creating and making clay projects using the kiln, something we cannot do in school.

If anyone would like to come and support the children in school with their reading, design and technology sessions, such as sewing/cooking and general help and support it would be greatly appreciated. REVEREND PHIL WRITES Happy New Year and Hello to East Coker, Closworth and Sutton Bingham! - 6 January 2025

I write on the Feast of the Epiphany, an ancient Christian Festival when the church remembers the story of the Magi coming with their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the infant Jesus (Gospel of Matthew chapter 2). It is also connected with the story of the adult Jesus' own baptism by John the Baptist that commenced his ministry, together themes of beginnings and journeys. I just had the joy of leading a very joyful assembly with the children at West Coker School where we thought together about how faith encourages us on long and difficult journeys.

I have been Rector/Vicar of the Coker Ridge Benefice, including All Saints Closworth, St Michael's East Coker and All Saints Sutton Bingham, since early October and it has been a bit of a whirlwind of meeting people and getting to know places. I feel immensely privileged to be in such a beautiful corner of the country and have found people to be full of kindness and grace. This journey for me I hope will be a long one, and I would love to be able to help all seven of the village communities to find spaces where they can be encouraged in their relationships with God and with one another. I do have a strong faith, and I've given my life to try to make sense of it and do my best to follow the Lord Jesus, but I know I'm probably not right about everything and certainly don't have all the answers. I trust each of you have your own stories of faith and thinking and I'd be very happy to listen as well as to share.

I'm so privileged to be able to look forward to at least one wedding at both Closworth and East Coker this year, hopefully some christenings/baptisms, all the beautiful Holy Communion services and of course funerals are powerful and precious occasions. I am so very grateful to all the wonderful volunteers and supporters of these Churches, whether they have lots of faith or a little, for this is your church.

2025 Special (provisional) Plans

I am especially looking forward to some special events through the year, in addition to our regular services and the festivals you would expect like Christmas, Easter, Remembrance etc.

- The St Michael's East Coker Annual Parochial Church Meeting is planned for 7.00pm on Wednesday 2
 April in the Dampier Room of East Coker Hall.
- The All Saints, Sutton Bingham Annual Parochial Church Meeting is planned for Sunday 6 April, straight after the 11.00am Service finishes.
- I hope to lead a Maundy Thursday Holy Communion Service at St Michael's at 7.00pm on 17 April.
- I hope to celebrate the Festival of the Ascension on Thursday 29 May with a 7.00pm Holy Communion at All Saints, Closworth.
- I have some provisional ideas for a 'Coker Ridge Pilgrimage Weekend' over 6-8 June where we encourage people to visit as many of the seven Churches at their own pace and engage with family friendly activities and prayer stations at each one.



One big 'thank you' must go to our new vicar. If you have not been to church recently, come back. He is young and very good with young children - and very welcoming. Thank you, Rev Phil.
